# January 18th General Meeting and CLE on Collections for the Non-Collection Attorney

The Advocates' General Meeting was held on January 18, 2024, at the Copernicus Center. The evening included networking, delicious Polish food and an informative CLE.

Attorney and Advocates Officer Julia Smolka delivered a one-hour CLE titled Collection Basics for the Non-Collection Attorney. In the CLE, she discussed when a party can start collecting on a money judgment. She discussed the common collection practices such as garnishments, citation proceedings, and recording judgment liens. She also discussed basic bankruptcy procedure for when a creditor forces a debtor into bankruptcy. She offered scenarios and examples from her 23 years practicing in commercial litigation. The lively interactive session was well attended.

# March 21st General Meeting and CLE on Emerging Developments in Data Privacy

The Advocates' General Meeting was held on March 21, 2024, at the Copernicus Center. The evening included networking, delicious Polish food and an informative CLE.

The presentation provided an overview of the most recent developments on the European data privacy arena (including the General Data Protection Regulation), as well as laws that have been adopted by various states in the last years. Presenters, Justyn Regan and Anthony Jacob, introduced the most common problems that attorneys may face when working on contracts involving data transfers, data collection or data processing.

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## Advocate SPOTLIGHT: Attorney Mariusz Zatorski

To acquaint readers better with Members of the Advocate Society, we spotlight a Member in each issue. In this issue, we feature a Question and Answer with Mariusz Zatorski, a lawyer in private practice who practices family law and bankruptcy law at LSR Family Law Group.

#### Why are you a member of the Advocates Society?

I first heard of the Advocates Society by chance while working for a bankruptcy firm right after law school. It was not until I started practicing family law and began to volunteer my services at Amicus Poloniae and the Chicago Volunteer Legal Services (CVLS), however, that I became interested in joining the Advocates Society. Through those connections, I met attorneys who were active members of the Society, including then-current



officers and former presidents. I quickly began to appreciate the significance and influence the Advocates Society has in Chicago's legal community in general, and the Polish community in particular. This was particularly important to me as someone born in Poland, who has family on both continents, and who is proud of his native language, history, and tradition.

## Give us an example of how being a member of the Advocates Society empowered you as an attorney.

As a member of the Advocates Society, I try to attend every meeting and function hosted or sponsored by the organization. This gives me the opportunity to rub shoulders with past and current leaders in the legal profession and allows me to give back to the Polish community of which I am proud. The continuing legal education offered by the Advocates Society as well as participation in their sponsored events allows me to develop professionally and gives me confidence as an attorney that I have the Advocates Society in my corner.

#### Share any other information about yourself that you think our readers would enjoy.

I practice family and bankruptcy law at LSR Family Law Group with a former president and an active member of the Advocates Society, Steve Rakowski, whom I consider a mentor and who is also proud of his Polish heritage. I like to travel, I follow sports, I've run a few marathons (including the Chicago Marathon in 2011), and I still would like to complete the Iron Man race.









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# What Is the Judicial Performance Evaluation Program? Insights from a Facilitator



Judges, just like the attorneys who practice in their courtrooms, benefit greatly from feedback on how well they're performing in their jobs. While attorneys typically work closely with their peers, and likely undergo regular performance reviews in their law firms, this process is more difficult for judges. Judging tends to be a solitary endeavor. While there's time for judges to talk and compare notes at the end of the day, for the most part judges work alone in their individual courtrooms while other judges do the same. Of By Hon. Mitchell L. Hoffman, course, judges occasionally get positive or negative feedback from the Appellate Court, but a candid and detailed assessment of how a judge handles his or her courtroom on a day-to-day basis can only come from the attorneys and court staff who share the courtroom with them, and who are able to respond to detailed questions on a confidential basis. It's of information kind that supports professional development for judges.

> In March of 2011 the Illinois Supreme Court launched a new program for mandatory judicial performance evaluation. As stated in Supreme Court Rule 58, "[T]he program is designed for the purpose of achieving excellence in the performance of individual judges and the improvement of the judiciary as a whole". Since the inception of the program, well over 1,000 Illinois judges have gone through this performance evaluation process.

> Under the Supreme Court program, judges are confidentially evaluated by the attorneys who appear before them, and the court staff who serve in their courtrooms. The evaluated judges are then required to meet with another judge from outside their own circuit who is a trained facilitator. The evaluated judge and the facilitator will confidentially review the evaluation, process and discuss the information, and work together on strategies to address issues that may be presented by the results.

As the Supreme Court worked with the National Center for State Courts to develop the program, they compiled a comprehensive electronic questionnaire for the purpose of measuring many specific aspects of judicial performance. Having worked as a facilitator in the program, I can tell you that the questionnaire is far more detailed than any bar association survey. The questionnaire seeks specific information on the judge's legal ability, impartiality, professionalism, communication and court management skills. Each of these general areas is broken down into an individual section containing many specific questions designed to gauge performance on discrete skills using a numerical scale. The questionnaire also allows for comments relating to the judge's performance in each specified area. The final evaluation is compiled with all identifying information about the responding attorneys and court staff removed.

A key part of the Supreme Court's program is the training of the judges who will become evaluation facilitators. Facilitators are active or retired judges with at least 6 years of experience who have been selected to undergo facilitator training. The judges selected to be facilitators go through a training process which covers not only how the performance evaluation program operates, but how to best work with the evaluated judges when reviewing the evaluation results, a process which can be delicate and challenging at times (as with performance reviews in any professional setting).

I've served as a facilitator since 2012, and although I was at first concerned about the time commitment and the inherent difficulties of the assignment, looking back over the past 11 years I have to say that it's been one of the most rewarding experiences of my judicial career (and one that I continue in my retirement). Sometimes, the evaluations provide a lot

of positive feedback and very little negative. Other evaluations clearly highlight one or more areas that need improvement. Reading the report can be a difficult and humbling experience for some evaluated judges, and their reactions can range from relief to surprise, irritation or even dejection.

As I see it, the interaction between the evaluated judge and the facilitator is really a two-way street, and the best way to help another judge work through a performance issue is to acknowledge that each of us sometimes share the same frustrations, problems and shortcomings in fulfilling our judicial duties. The important thing is to be able to assess and respond to any criticism you receive in a positive and productive way. Often this involves the evaluated judge and the facilitator comparing notes on how the court calls or legal cultures in their respective circuits may be similar or different. It's also important to identify what stressors may affect judge's performance. Ultimately these discussions lead to brainstorming specific solutions for improvement in the identified problem areas.

Depending on the results of the evaluation, these discussions could include strategies for keeping your cool in stressful circumstances, how to determine when to speed up or slow down while managing a high-volume court call, making sure to clearly state the reasons for a ruling, or how to deal with self-represented litigants fairly and effectively. I have frequently learned quite a bit from the judges I work with in the program, and often continue to communicate with them after the formal process is completed.

I think the most important takeaway for attorneys reading this article is that they should trust that the process is taken very seriously by the evaluated judges. Although I've seen a wide array of responses

to the evaluations from different judges, I can honestly say that judges take the results very seriously and that most of them benefit from the process and develop concrete plans for improving their performance. This of course is not possible unless attorneys also take the process seriously, and that means taking the time and making the effort to fill out the questionnaire honestly and completely. By responding with your honest input, you'll be doing your part to improve the judiciary and to thereby enhance the quality of justice delivered to the public. That's the ultimate goal that both the bench and the bar are focused on achieving.

# Poland's History, Culture and Traditions



## Krakow, The Heart & Soul of Poland

A trip to Poland isn't complete without visiting Krakow, located in southern Poland, one of the largest cities (with a population of about 750,000) and known for its amazing architecture. It even served as the capital of Poland for 300 years until 1611 when it was moved to Warsaw.

My sister lived there the summer of 1987 on a scholarship from the Kosciuszko Foundation, studying history and the Polish language at Jagiellonian University, a Medieval facility and the second oldest university in central Europe. It is accredited by the U.S. Department of Education.

Even though Poland still was under communist rule at that time, she along with the other international students of all ages could go about relatively freely, especially with planned field trips such as a visit to the shrine of our Lady of Czestochowa (the

Black Madonna) on her feast day, Aug. 26. Under this title, Mary was crowned the Patron and Protector of Poland since 1655, and this international icon became the symbol of national unity. My sister, Marya named for Mary, also was able to take a two-hour trip to the Zakopane Mountains, Poland's winter resort, breathtaking even in warmer months.

But her favorite spot was Saint Mary's Basilica (Kościół Mariacki), a Brick Gothic church adjacent to the Main Market Square in Krakow. Built in the 14th century, its foundation dates back to the early 13th century and serves as one of the best examples of Polish Gothic architecture. The main section of the church goes back to 1497, but its most stunning site is a stained glass window from 1370 and a magnificent altar (built 1477–89) by Viet Stoss (Wit Stosz) of Germany, considered one of the greatest sculptors and wood carvers of the 1500's. He did much of his work throughout Poland.
